

How to File Your Legitimation



Make sure you have all your court forms.

- ✓ It is very important that you read the instructions on this sheet.

- ✓ Take all your forms with you to court.

Follow these steps.

1st

Review your forms to make sure they are correct. Arrange your forms into **three** complete sets in the order that they were listed in I-CAN!. Attach any supporting documents to your *Petition*.

2nd

Take your forms to a Notary Public. Sign and date any forms that require notarization in the presence of the Notary.

3rd

File your forms. Take all three sets of your forms to the Clerk's office of the Court named at the top of your forms. The clerk will charge you a fee to file your forms. Keep one set of forms for your records.

4th

Serve the other party. Arrange for a Sheriff to serve a copy of your court forms on the other party.

5th

Register for and attend the Families in Transition Seminar. Please call (404) 730-4618 for more information.

6th

Attend the hearing or conference. After you file your forms, you will receive a notice with the date, time, and location of your hearing. Bring all of your court forms to the hearing.

How to Prepare for Your Legitimation Hearing

Follow these steps.

Know your hearing date. After you file your forms, you will receive notice of the date, time, and location of your hearing. **Be sure to go to your hearing.**

Practice what you want to say.

Prepare brief notes about what you want to say, so that you will be organized.

Bring your court forms, any evidence and any witnesses that may help you in your case.

At the hearing, any evidence you plan to present in court, must be shown to the other party and then to the deputy. If you have any witnesses, let the judge know. They may need to wait outside the courtroom while you are testifying.

NOTE: No cameras or weapons are allowed in the courthouse.

Get to the court 30 minutes early.

1. There may be a line to get through court security at the entrance to the court.
2. Go to the courtroom. Your case will be listed on the calendar.
3. When the courtroom opens, go in and tell the clerk or deputy that you are present.
4. Watch the other cases so you will know what to do.
5. When your name is called, go to the table set up for the parties.

The judge will ask you questions.

- Be polite
- Call the judge "Your Honor".
- Do not speak directly to the other party when you are before the judge.
- Do not interrupt anyone.
- Tell the judge if you don't understand a question.
- Stick to the point. Answer the question you are asked.
- Wait for a copy of any orders.
